A nine month's daily job of such vast proportions, to say the least, we were stunned. However, only one club member present actually took issue and said it could not be done, that the women would not do it, that they would start but they would never see it through.

Mrs. Everitt stood her ground! She said it could be done, the need here was great enough to inspire the women, and if the women of Beaufort wanted to do it nothing could stop them!

That was an exciting meeting! Of course there was much discussion and Mrs. Eventh had an answer for every question; she had seen it done elsewhere and it could be done.
