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Defending League Champs With 8-1 Win over Salter Pa

DALLAS Wayne Arthur electrified some 500 baseball enthusiasts and spellbound the Salter Path Braves yesterday afternoon as the champion Eastern Blues waltzed back home with an 8-1 triumph tucked away in their bat bags.

Scenic Burnetts Field provided the setting in Salter Path as Lefty Arthur mystified 24 strikeout victims, a Seashore League record, in this opening success for the defending champion Blues. The 22year-old southpaw won 10 and lost none for the undefeated Blues last year. But yesterday's gem saw him at his strikeout best.

DALLAS' FIRST two

pitches were balls. Then he came in with a blistering fast ball that Neal Smith hammered 340-feet away over the left field fence for the game's only home run. Leftfielder Joe Willis draped himself into the mesh barrier in a gallant try. But that drive was long gone.

And that was it for the Braves. Shortstop Neal outguessed the Blues' pitcher three more times, waited for his fast ball and collected two singles and a triple in a 4-for-5 day at the plate. Craig Weber, the fiery Braves' catcher, solved Dallas for two singles and a walk and stole a base.

BUT THE other ten players summoned by Salter Path Manager Otis Pittman could add only three more safe blows, two of them infield scratches.

Arthur blew his blazing fast ball past the Braves for most of his strikeouts. But he also kept the batters off balance with a swooping overhand curve and a sweeping sidearm whistler.

HE WALKED four and had a long count on several batters. But this tendency toward wildness, if you can call it that, came when his live fast ball jumped out of the strike zone. We'll be hearing a lot more from this 6-foot 170-pounder from
