

# Morehead Bows to Wallace 65-62 in Overtime Tuesday

Wallace ended Morehead hopes in the District II double-A tournament at Jacksonville Tuesday night with a surprise 65-62 victory in overtime.

Guard Rodney Kemp gave another outstanding performance

for the Eagles. He directed the Morehead offense, scoring 22 points, and was the team's outstanding defensive player. George Dill accounted for another 18 points; Robert McLean, 10; Cecil Sewell, 7; John Hatcher and Baxter Brittingham, 2 each; and John Lee, 1.

Wallace-Rose Hill grabbed a 3-point lead in the first period, outscoring Morehead 13 to 10, and held the lead at the half, as both teams made 13 points in the second quarter. But the Eagles poured in 20 points to Wallace's 7 in the third period to claim a 10-point lead, 43-33, going into the fourth period.

McLean, who found himself in foul trouble in the first half, sat out the third quarter and a few minutes of the fourth. The Eagles still lead by 3 points, 52-49, with a minute and a half remaining.

McLean, back in the game, ended several Morehead attempts to freeze the ball, with as many unsuccessful shots. Wallace tied the game on a field goal and foul shot with seconds remaining.

The Wallace eagles continued to hit in overtime, leading by as much as 5 points, 63-58. Two field goals by Kemp put the Eagles back in contention, 63-62, but a two-pointer by Wallace's Joe Batts, with 10 seconds left, iced the game.

Batts was high scorer for Wallace, with 21 points. Also scoring were John Wilkins, 12; Donald Hardison, 9; Pigford, 8; Ernest Warren, 6; Julian Hawes, 4; Hornell, 3; and Longest, 2. They sank 21 field goals, but picked up 23 points from the free-throw line.

Morehead outscored Wallace from the floor, with 27 field goals, but made only 8 points from the line. McLean, Sewell and Lee fouled out in the fourth period.

## Little Kids Switch To Bowling in Schools

Hopkinsville, Ky. (AP)—In basketball-conscious Kentucky, bowling has become the major winter recreational activity for fifth and sixth grades in Hopkinsville schools.
