# Eagles Top Wilmington Junior Varsity, 27-19

The Morehead City Eagles made it six in a row Friday night as they downed Wilmington's junior varsity team, 27-19, at the Morehead City field. Since losing the second game of the season, 7-6, to Swansboro, the Eagles have beat Farmville, Jones Central, Beaufort, Camp Lejeune, Pamlico Central, and the Wilmington JV. They now have a season's record of 7 wins against the J loss.

Wilmington's Wild Kittens scored on three lightning plays, and the Eagle defense kept them bottled up for the rest of the game. They scored the first touchdown of the game on a 96-yard pass play, from Tom Henegar to Hollis Hales.

The Eagles came back and tied it up, 6-6, on a 45-yard run by Gerald Jones. James Guthrie ran for the extra point, and the Eagles led, 7-6.

**Norman Intercepts**  
Sherrill Norman made the sec-

ond Eagle touchdown on a pass interception. He snagged a Wild Kitten aerial on the Wilmington 35-yard line and tore down the side lines for the score. Gerald Jones made the extra point run, and the Eagles led, 14-6.

Quarterback John Glancy put the Eagles ahead, 20-6, when he went across on a quarterback sneak from the 3-yard line. The try for extra point was no good, and the Eagles led, 20-6, at half time.

The Wild Kittens came back strong in the second half. On the third play of the half, Howard Knox intercepted a pass by Jones and raced 35 yards for a touchdown. The try for the extra point was no good and the score stood at 20-12.

**92-Yard Run**  
The Eagles took the kick-off and marched to the Wilmington 8-yard line before they were stopped. The Wild Kittens took over and on the

second play, Hales tipped off a 92-yard scoring run to put them back in the game. Bob Roycroft's first try for the extra point was no good, but a penalty against the Eagles gave him a second try. His second kick split the uprights, and the Eagles led by one point, 20-19.

**Swinson Scores**  
The Eagles took the next kick-off on their own 30, and Jones returned it to the 40. He and Guthrie drove the ball to the Wilmington 30-yard line, where Glancy took over. He completed a pass to end Lynwood Swinson, who lateraled to Jones. The play carried 21 yards to the 9.

On the next play, Glancy threw to Swinson in the end zone. Guthrie made the extra point, and the Eagles led, 27-19.

Neither team was able to muster another scoring drive and the teams battled on even terms for the rest of the game.
