

Morehead Girls Double Score; Eagles Defeat Camp Lejeune

Eagles Sweep First Twin Bill of Season Tuesday

The Morehead City Eagles swept both ends of a doubleheader at Camp Lejeune Tuesday night, the first time this year that the Morehead City teams have pulled the trick. The Eaglettes doubled the score on the Lejeune sextet, 48-23, and the Eagles romped over the Devil Pups to the tune of 51-28. The Eaglettes let their hair down and played a hard, aggressive game against the big team which handed them a 28-75 defeat earlier in the season. The Morehead lassies drove through the Lejeune guards for 11 points in the first quarter, 19 in the second, 11 in the third, and 5 in the fourth.

Held to 11

The guards held the losers to 11 points during the entire first half. They allowed 15 in the second half.

Anna Faye Willis scored 26 points for high scoring honors, more points than the losers were able to muster from four forwards. Ginny Lou Smithwick connected for 10 points, Faye Jones collected 8, and June Seamon completed the scoring with 2 markers.

Kate Willis, Sally Morris, Betty Willis, and Jessie White, the first four guards for the Eaglettes, helped the Lejeune sextet get started on the wrong foot, as they held the losers to 4 points in the first quarter. Patsy Robinson, Annette Cooper, Lucy Harris, Cookie Goodwin, and Frances Gaskins combined to hold the losers score down, as they threw up a tight defense the time they were in the game. Phinney was high scorer for the losers with 7 points.

In the second game the Eagles jumped off to an 11-6 lead in the first quarter and coasted it with Coach Cannon Talbot clearing his bench in the rout. It was the second victory over Lejeune for the Eagles, who took a 59-29 decision in December.

Jewelynn Phillips was the big gun in the Eagles attack, pouring

22 points through the nets. Darden Eure collected 12 points while he was in the game. Frank Sanderson hit for 9 markers to be third man on the Eagle offense.

Folk was the only Devil Pup who was really in the ball game. He scored 13 points and played a tough rebounding game. Peterson hit for 6 points, Stevenson got 4, Mattershead collected 3, and Anthony scored 2 points.

The Eagles pulled away to a 28-15 lead at the half, with substitutes playing a good part of the time. Only six Eagles managed to score, however. In addition to Phillips, Eure, and Sanderson, Lynwood Durham connected for 4 points, and Walter Morris and John Phillips hit for 2 each.
