

## All Conference Girls Team To Be Selected

For the first time since THE NEWS-TIMES began sponsoring the All Seashore Conference Basketball Team three years ago, an All Conference girls team will be selected.

Ballots have been sent to all 13 schools in the conference, and the basketball coaches have been asked to return them as soon as possible. Each coach will name 10 boys and 12 girls in the order which he thinks there are two coaches, the boys coach will fill out one blank, and the girls coach will complete the second one.

The ballots are set up on a total points system, with the first named player for each position getting 10 points, the second nine points, and so on down the line.

The forwards and centers have been grouped as one voting section as opposed to guards. In this manner, the three best forwards and centers will be awarded first team honors. In order to preserve a well rounded team, two guards will have to be selected, even though there may be forwards and centers in the conference who are better all round ball players.

Girls will be voted on as forwards and guards. Ten points will be awarded to the first girl listed

on each division of a coaches ballot.

The results of the balloting will be tabulated as votes are received, and these partial, as well as the final, results will be published.

They split their two games with Jones Central, and the game in which they defeated the Jones County team was the only one which the Rockettes had lost. Pamlico took the title because they had played more conference games.

Both Jones Central teams came in second in the standings. Coach Joe Williams accepted the trophies.

The trophies were awarded at the coaches' meeting since there will not be a conference tournament this year. The tournament has been in the red nearly every year, since the best teams in the conference are already playing in state play-offs and cannot participate in the tourney.

## Norman Clark Elected President of Conference

Norman Clark, Morehead City, was elected president of the Seashore Conference during a business meeting of the conference at Atlantic Monday night. John Morris, White Oak, was elected secretary. The two officers were elected unanimously after they had been suggested by a nominating committee composed of Jack Johnson, Atlantic, Wayne Benton, Swansboro, and Stewart Daniels, Smyrna.

Mr. Benton suggested that the conference divide into eastern and western divisions. Teams could play outside their division, of course, but only games within the division would count in final standings.

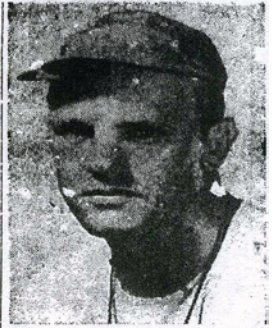
At the end of the season the winners in each division would meet for the championship. This play-off game would eliminate the county tournament.

The proposal was adopted and will take effect with the opening of baseball season. Since only eight of the conference schools plan to play football next season, there will be no division in football.

Tom McQuaid, Beaufort, was named chairman of the eastern division, which includes the five schools in Carteret County, Havelock, and Pamlico. Gannon Talbert, Morehead City, was named secretary of the division.

Mr. Benton and Joe Williams, Jones Central, will head the western division, composed of Jones Central, Swansboro, Dixon, White Oak, Richlands, and Camp Lejeune.

Since there will be no conference tournament this year, trophies were awarded to the first and second place winners in regular season play. The Newport boys and Pamlico girls won first place trophies, and Jones Central, boys and girls, took the second place trophies.
