The Seadog school will become a member of the conference with the start of next year's "chool term which means that they will enter oth the league's football and basketball races.

The addition of Beaufort as a conference-member-will boost the league from a four-team to a five-team con-ference. Already members of the Coastal Plains are Wallace-Rose Hill, Morehead City, Jones Central and

The loss of Beaufort to the Coastal conference will leave the Class 1-A circuit with seven teams, however the conference has already approved the membership applications of two schools which will boost it to nine.

The two new schools in the Coastal conference next year will be Bath and Snow Hill. Bath will enter 11man football competition for the first time after winning the state eight-man title for the last three years running. Their latest title came just last Thursday night when they routed Candor 33-13 in the final game of the eight-man playoffs. The win was also the 45th straight for Bath.

But impressive as both Bath and Beaufort's grid records were this year in their respective leagues, they can be expected to get their knocks next year. that moves up a notch in classification will require a period of transition before it is able to compete on an equal basis with the larger schools. Rumors have been spread that both North Duplin


