

DUKE WINS FROM GENERALS AGAIN

Devils Push Two Markers Across Plate in Ninth to Win from Washington and Lee

Duke added another Conference win to its column Monday when she won from Washington and Lee by a 5-3 count. The score was knotted at 3-3 in the last of the ninth, but Hanna, Washington and Lee fielder, dropped Hawkins' long fly, letting Deane and Adams score to put the game on ice for Duke.

Up until the eighth inning, it seemed that the Generals would win from Duke. In the eighth frame, however, Duke came from behind to score two runs to tie up the count, then in the last session scored two more to win the game.

Lefty Jenkins, Duke southpaw, allowed the Generals only four hits, while his team mates were gathering 11 off Williams, hurler for Washington and Lee. Jenkins received better support than did Williams, Duke being charged with only 1 error while Washington and Lee made 5 miscues.

LOWELL HIGH IS STATE CHAMPION

In the fifth inning Lowell squeezed one run across for their first score. They also tallied once in each of the next two innings. Colfax threatened several times during the contest, loading the bases twice, but their batters failed to hit in the pinches and the men were left stranded on the bases. Lee Hawkins, for Lowell, struck out 10 men and allowed only eight scattered hits.

FIRST AID COURSE COMPLETED BY 28

More Than Half Of Those Enrolled In Local Class Pass Examinations

In the recent first-aid classes conducted by Charles Mix of the National Red Cross, 28 Durhamites passed successfully the examinations, according to Mrs. Ethel Walker, executive secretary.

Certificates will be mailed to the successful candidates immediately, it was announced yesterday.

There were 45 enrolled in the classes, but due to the lack of sufficient training on the part of some they were unable to qualify for a certificate. The certificates are good for three years, after which time they must be renewed.

The first-aid school was conducted at the City Hall by Mix Jan. 6 to 17. Students were required to attend the school three hours each night, five nights each week, for the two-week period. Those not attending all classes were not awarded certificates, Mrs. Walker explained. Most of the persons represented different firms or industries, and now will serve as instructors at the places which they are employed.
