

## **Pony League Needs Players**

Registration for the county Pony League was held Saturday in four communities and, with the exception of Beaufort, was disappointing to leage officials.

In Morehead City only 19 boys signed up to play baseball this summer. Because of the small number, league officials have decided to hold another registration period this Saturday. It will be held at the recreation center again from 9-12 and 1-3.
