

## DURHAM BULLS GET EVEN BREAK AT HENDERSON

Veasey Pitches Locals To 3-1 Victory But Loses Night-cap, 9 To 4

Henderson, July 21. — (Special) — The Durham Bulls and Henderson split two league games here this afternoon, the Bulls winning the first contest 3 to 1 and Henderson taking the night-cap 9 to 4.

### VEASEY SCATTERS HITS

Veasey held the locals well in check during the first game. He did not allow a hit until the sixth inning and kept the five made in the closing innings well scattered. An error was partly responsible for the sole Henderson tally. Both teams hit hard in the second game, piling up a total of 22 hits evenly divided. Pleasant blanked the Bulls for the first five innings but weakened in the last two stanzas.

### POWELL STARS

Powell caught the second game for the local aggregation and showed up well behind the bat as well as leading the attack with three hits out of three at bat. Hawkins led the Bulls in hitting and also stole two bases.

B. Fields, Durham second baseman, and Scoggins, local shortstop, furnished the fielding features of the game, both men making several sparkling catches.
