The tentative schedule calls for four complete rounds in which each team meets each other eight times. Three weeks will be required to complete each round, allowing ample time for playoffs.

16-Player Rosters

Club officials, agreed to carry 16-player rosters, including managers, with a ban on non-released players hooking up with other clubs. Releases must be had from parent clubs before ball players can make deals for themselves. Upon release, they are declared free agents, and, after 30 days, may join any club desiring their services.

A stiff \$50 delay fine also was approved, instead of the customary \$25. Any team failing to appear

at a scheduled game within 30 minutes after game once must pay the \$50 penalty within 10 days.

Umpires for the new circuit have not been picked as yet, but Grant Previtt was nominated umpire-inchief. He is expected to submit a list of available men-in-blue. Six umpires will be selected.
