

had a battle on his hands all the way from Tom Woody, while schoolboy phenomenon Stewart coasted to an easy win over newlyacquired lefthander Gene Fink.

Under the Beaufort arcs fans saw the best game of the young season as Piner and Woody hooked up in a battle of righthanders. Piner, in gaining the win, struck out nine with an assortment of fastballs and curves, and issued two frice passes, while sidearm specialist Woody, tagged with the tough loss, gave up only two hits. also fanned nine and walked one. Both Beaufort hits were collected by third baseman Bob (Rip) Rybnikar-one a long triple in the third.

Bay Bolts Home

But Rybnikar's hits didn't mean uch. Co-hero with Piner was much. batterymate Reggie Bay. It was his legs. dare-devil baserunning in the third that gave Piner the ball game. The speedy maskman walked to open the inning, stole second, advanced to third on Piner's sharp grounder to first, and with Rybnikar at bat. stole home before startled Woody could come out of his full windup. What was in the cards after Bay slid in nobody knows, but Rybni-kar, with a 32 count, then deliver-ed his line drive triple down the rightfield line. He was stranded.

however, when centerfielder Billy Price skied high to short. Time after time Morehead threatened to break the ball game wide open, but Piner, breaking his curve over the outside corners, was equal to the occasions, stranding eight runners.

He was in a hole right from the first inning when both Rybnikar and leftfielder Carl Sadler erred on Bill Holt's ground smash. But after Holt stole second, Piner got Fenner Boyd on a bounder to sec-ond, struck out slugger Haywood Kelly, and forced Ernie Conner to pop to first baseman Sam Mc-Carney.

Woody Wallops Hit

Woody rapped out the first Morehead hit in the fifth. and Skinny Ellis, Kelly, and Conner followed

two runs on four scattered singles. Gaskins permitted the remaining three runs on one hit.

Kelly, the fancy-dan first sacker, showed fans he can flail the hickory also by clubbing in two runs doubles and a home run. His tow-ering round tripper in the sixth. with nobody on, traveled clear over the leftfield wall, 390 feet awaya drive in any man's league. of his doubles also caromed off the centerfield gym.

Fink Fails Badly

Starter Fink lasted only two innings as Morehead started fast with four runs on four hits. After Holt grounded out pitcher to first, El-lis walked, took third on Kelly's first double to deep left, and scored when McCarney, playing first, let Woody's smash go through his

In the second, catcher Carl An-In the second, catcher carl An-derson walked, went to third on Stewart's rap out into right, and came around on Holt's two base line drive along the rightfield line. Stewart came in a moment later on Ellis' grounder to third, with Holt scoring when Kelly bounced a sing-le off third baseman Price's glove. That was all for Fink, and in came McCarney from first. He went

the remaining distance, being nick-ed for six hits and the last four runs. One big inning—the fifth— clinched the victory for Tuttle's crew when they tallied three times on an infield area singles by El on an infield error, singles by El-lis, Boyd, Tuttle, and Kelly's long double off the gym.

And with two out the following inning, Kelly stepped into the first offering by McCarney and sent it on a high arc out of the ball park. Stewart's one bad inning was the first when he gave up two runs before warming up. He walked three, balked once, and gave Price a bingle. From then on to the eighth, when Manager Tuttle yank-
