# Blue Devils Capture Twin Victories Over Lejeune

The Smyrna Blue Devils, at full strength for the first time in two weeks, hung a 61-46 loss on Camp Lejeune Thursday night at Smyrna. The Smyrna girls won a 75-57 decision in the first game of the doubleheader.

Curtis Nelson was the big gun for the Blue Devils as he hit for 22 points. Dale Lewis, who has been nursing an ankle injury, scored 14 points. Horace Lawrence scored 13 points and Braxton Piner scored 10. Carroll Hill, the fifth starter, failed to score. Roland Lewis, a substitute, hit for two points for the Blue Devils.

The Blue Devils got off to a fast start, scoring 17 points in the first quarter and 18 in the second. At the half the Smyrna lads held a 35-19 lead.

The Lejeune quintet played aggressive ball in an effort to keep up their end of the scoring. The officials called 20 fouls against the Devil Pups, though, and the Blue Devils cashed in on 17 of 27 free throws.

Only 14 fouls were called against Smyrna and the Devil Pups scored on eight of 19 foul shots.

Smyrna coach Jimmy Parkin cleared his bench in the final quarter after the Blue Devils had built a 50-35 lead. Each team scored 11 points in the final quarter. Lejeune stuck with five players until the final two minutes, when the coach cleaned his bench.

High scorer for the losers was Art Potts, who scored 13 points.

Jean Willis went on a scoring spree for Smyrna in the first game. The tall forward scored 43 points in leading the home team to a 75-57 victory.

With Willis hitting for 25 points in the first quarter, the Smyrna lassies built a 51-10 lead that was never threatened. Coach Parkin used his reserves in the second quarter and Lejeune cut two points off the Smyrna lead before the half. The score had Smyrna out front by a 42-23 score at intermission.

With the first team back in the Smyrna lassies hit for 22 points in the third quarter, six more than Lejeune managed. The Smyrna reserves played the final period, giving up 18 points to Lejeune while scoring only 11.

The Lejeune rally came too late in the game to have any effect on the outcome.

Scoring for Smyrna were Willis, 43, Carolyn Phelps, 8, Brenda Golden, 5, Brenda Baker, 9, and Melinda Gillikin, 10. Other forwards were Rose Arthur, Claudia Brown and Sally Hooper, who usually plays guard.
