Figures Prove Archers Improved in Hunting

North Carolina archers are becoming better hunters, according to figures released recently by the Wildlife Resources Commission. In 1957, hunters with bow and arrow needed 95 man-days in the woods to take home a deer. During the 1958 season on wildlife management areas the archers reduced hunting time to 53 man-days per kill.

Frank Barick, chief of the commission's game division, released the figures from five management areas where special archery hunts were held. Contrasting the two years, Barick stated, "Last year, in 473 man-days of bow hunting, archers bagged only five deer. This year, 2,610 man-days yielded 45 deer and four wild hogs for an average of 53 man-days per kill."

"The either-sex deer hunting allowed this year for the first time undoubtedly did much to improve the average," Barick continued, "but probably more important was the element of more experienced hunters and more skilled bowmen."

The harvest from the five wildlife management areas represents most of the increasingly popular bow hunting in the state. Standing Indian Wildlife Management area
