Contrasting the two years, Barick stated, "Last year, in 473 man-days of bow hunting, archers bagged only five deer. This year, 2,610 man-days yielded 45 deer and four wild hogs for an average of 53 man-days per kill.

"The either-sex deer hunting allowed this year for the first time undoubtedly did much to improve the average," Barick continued, "but probably more important was the element of more experienced hunters and more skilled bowmen.'

The harvest from the five wildlife management areas represents most of the increasingly popular bow hunting in the state. Standing Indian Wildlife Management area
