Skipper Keeps Invaders' Hit Hits Scattered In Legion Stadium Tilt

The Wilmington Pirates evened the score with Dubs Sandwich team from Durham yesterday as they took that fast semi-pro team into camp to the tune of 13 to 3 at the Legion stadium.

The locals clubbed the offerings of Pope for a total of 17 safe blows, five of which were for extra bases, big John Sellers getting three two-baggers during the game. Skipper kept the 10 safe hits of the Sandwigers scattered except in the first and third stanzas when they bunched their hits for runs. Other than those innings the Pirate hurler was never in danger.

The Durham outfit flew apart in the first inning, afield as the locals forged ahead on an error of S. McKeithan grounder to third, a walk to Alford, and error on the pitcher of Allen's grounder and H. McKeithan's first hit off the locals, Hines hit scoring S. McKeithan, with all and scoring on Carter's lusty wallopp good for two bases. After that the visitors never threatened to even the score and Skipper took it easy from there on.

The game was held up for 45 minutes on account of rain, but a fair crowd of fans were on hand to cheer the locals to victory.

For the visitors, Overman showed up well at short, executing a neat putout on H. McKeithan who was caught off the second sack. He also hit for three bases the longest blow of the game. S. McKeithan and Allen played their usual good defensive game also contributing to the run making.

The outstanding hitter for Wilmington was Sellers who collected three two-base hits out of five trips to the plate. For the Dubs, Hawkins got three safeties out of four trips to the platter.

A line drive off the bat of Moore, put the visiting pitcher Pope on the bench in the eighth, Veasey finished without further damage being done by the locals. The Pirates journey to Comfort tomorrow, and will play here Saturday, the opposition to be announced later.

Strong Local Organization Merged Into Foremost Commercial Fraternity in Existence

ARE 22 CHARTER MEMBERS

National President is Leader in Installation Ceremonies Held on Campus; Banquet Held at Washington Duke Concludes Impressive Ritual; Prominent Economists Present

With the installation of Beta Eta chapter at Duke university Saturday evening, the fifty-second chapter of Alpha Kappa Psi, the oldest and largest commercial fraternity in the world, was established. The group receiving the charter formerly existed on the campus as Psi Kappa Alpha, a local commercial organization organized three years ago by a group of outstanding students in the business administration department.

It was the plan from the time of organization to petition Apha Kappa Psi, recognized as the most powerful commercial fraternity. The interest and co-operation of Professors J. H. Shields and C. E. London, faculty members of Alpha Kappa Psi, contributed in a large way to the realization of that goal.

The fraternity, which numbers among its members a large number of distinguished commercial leaders, both in industry and education, has as its purposes to foster scientific research in the fields of commerce, accounts, and finance; to educate the public along the lines of higher ideals in business, and to promote the development of commercial education in American universities. It now has a membership of about 7,000.

The 22 charter members were conducted through the very impressive rituals by O. A. Kirkman, grand president of the fraternity, Dr. Tipton R. Snavelly, dean of the school of commerce at the University of Virginia and district counsellor of the southern district, Dr. J. H. Shields, of Duke university, Dr. C. E.
