Seadogs Gain Revenge For Football, 78-64

The Beaufort Seadogs got sweet revenge Friday night when they rolled to a 78-64 victory over the visiting Morehead City Eagles. All five members of the Seadog starting team were on the football squad that lost a 47-6 decision to the Eagle grid machine.

The Seadogs showed little respect for the red and white as they really poured it on in the second half. The Eagles were holding a narrow 40-38 lead as the first half ended.

Llewellyn Phillips started things off for the Eagles, hitting on a pair of charity tosses to give the Morehead City team to a 2-0 advantage.

Ties Score

Raymond Gillikin, who played one of the best games of his career, tied the score with a jump shot. Jimmy Swann put the Eagles ahead again, only to see Gillikin tie the score again with a pair of free throws.

As the Eagles were bringing the ball down the court Gillikin stole the ball and passed off to Butch Hassell, who hit an easy two points to put the Seadogs ahead for the first time, 6-4.

The Eagles came right back and tied up the game on a two-pointer by John Phillips. Gillikin hit again and put the Seadogs back in the lead, 8-6.

Seadogs Take Lead

Alex Copeland hit five quick points for the Seadogs to spark a rally that ended with the Seadogs holding an 18-11 lead over the visitors.

Darden Eure and John Phillips went to work for the Eagles and cut the Seadog lead to nothing in about two minutes. Eure hit five quick points and Phillips added four. By the end of the quarter the Eagles held a 24-18 advantage.

Allen Autry replaced Copeland and Sammy Merrill went in for Pud Hassell as the second quarter opened. The other Seadog starters, Butch Hassell, Gillikin and Danny Willis, stayed in the game.

Coach Gannon Talbert stuck with his starting line-up of Llewellyn Phillips, Darden Eure, John Phillips, Walter Morris and Jimmy Swann. The only Eagle substitute of the game was Lynwood Durham.

The Seadogs staged a rally to pull up to within one point of the Eagles, 31-30, shortly after the second quarter opened.

Game Gets Wild

The game really got wild at this point. Six consecutive bad passes by the two teams kept the ball away from both baskets for about two minutes.

The epidemic started when the Seadogs stole the ball and started a fast break down the court. A bad pass went out of bounds and the Eagles took it out while players were still all over the court. A long pass got away from an Eagle forward and things went from bad to worse.

Beaufort coach T. H. McQuaid call for a time-out and both coaches tried to settle their charges down. The game slowed down a little after the time out.

Autry hit a hook shot and the Seadogs moved into the lead by a 32-31 score with 3:30 left in the

second quarter. The Eagles, led by Llewellyn Phillips, hit for five straight points and held a 36-32 lead before the Seadogs got back into the game. The half ended with the Eagle out front, 40-38.

Start, Second Half

Durham, Llewellyn Phillips, Swann, John Phillips and Eure started the second half for the Eagles. Starting for the Seadogs were Butch Hassell, Larry Dudley, Willis, Gillikin and Autry.

The Seadogs went ahead, 43-42, after the first two minutes of the third quarter when Butch Hassell missed a free throw and Autry grabbed the rebound and put it in for two points.

Eure hit a free throw to tie the score, but Hassell hit a field goal to put the Seadogs ahead for good a moment later. Beginning with a 45-43 lead, the Seadogs pulled ahead rapidly.

Willis hit a field goal and Dudley hit a free throw to give the Seadogs a five-point cushion. By the end of the third quarter the Seadogs had run up a nine-point lead, 55-46.

The Seadogs got red hot in the last quarter and shot 23 points while holding the Eagles to 18. Autry was the big gun in the Seadog splurge.

Scoring for Morehead City were Llewellyn Phillips, 21, John Phillips, 14, Eure, 19, Morris, 8, and Swann, 2.

Scoring for Beaufort were Autry, 19, Gillikin, 19, Butch Hassell, 15, Willis, 12, Pud Hassell, 1, Frank Potter, 2, Copeland, 5, Merrill, 2, and Dudley, 3.
