## Seadogs Impressive In Downing Arch Rivals

The Beaufort Seadogs, able to score against a variety of Smyrna defenses Friday night, settled the Beaufort-Smyrna dispute at least temporarily, with an impressive 73-64 win over the Blue Devils in a game played before an over-flow crowd in the Smyrna gymnasium.

The win was the 62nd consecutive victory for the de-

fending state champions and strengthened their position as favorites in the county race. Pud Hassell topped his previous seasonal high scoring performance by tallying 37 points which allowed Beaufort to lead virtually throughout the time. At one point in the third harter, the Seadog advantage over ieir arch rivals reached as much s 18 points.

The Blue Devils opened the game with a man to man defense on four f the Beaufort players and had burt Nelson playing a loose zone inder the basket. This left David lones open and the Seadogs took tuick advantage of the situation as hey fed the senior guard for three tuick baskets that put the Blue Devils in an early hole. Jones, with no one guarding him, dropped in two set shots and a layup before myrna changed their defensive lignment.

The Blue Devils took their only ad of the night in the opening econds of the game when Dale ewis hit a jumper from the side or a 2-0 Smyrna lead.

Ray Hassell then missed a free row for Beaufort but Chuck Lewis onnected on a field goal and Pud assell added a basket for a 4-2 eaufort lead.

Beaufort then put David Jones to ork and Beaufort opened its lead 10 points. Jones hit a layup at 10 pened to the first quarter to put 10 Beaufort lead at 22-11 over the lue Devils.

The Blue Devils managed to shave one point off the Seadog lead in the second quarter by outscoring the defending state champions 17-16. At one point in the quarter, a basket by Chuck Lewis had opened the Beaufort spread to 12 points.

The pressure on both teams was evident in the third quarter. The play became rougher as the game wore on. Beaufort added five more points to their halftime advantage to take a 59-45 lead at the end of the period

The Blue Devils refused to be counted out though and came fighting back in the fourth quarter to do their hottest shooting of the night, pouring 19 points through the net to Beaufort's 14. The Blue Devils lost their ton rebounder.

Free throwing statistics on the game showed a marked contras in the two teams' efficiency from the charity stripe. The Blue Devils hit on 24 of the 33 free throws they attempted for a 72.7 per cent accurary mark while the Seadogs were well below a good showing, hitting only 39.2 per cent of their gift shots. Of 28 free throws taken, the Seadogs missed on 17 of them.

The Smyrna boys and the Beaufort girls made it an all Beaufort-Smyrna final in the county tournament for tomorrow night by scoring easy first round wins Wednesday night at Atlantic. The Beaufort girls earned the tournament finals by rolling past Atlantic 58-45 and the Blue Devils had things pretty much their own way in burying the Newport Hawks 89-51.

The Blue Devils displayed an early accuracy from the floor as they raced to a gigantic 30-8 lead over the Hawks and then coasted through the remainder of the game as both their first and second units were able to maintain comfortable eads over the Hawks.

Deadly shooting from underneath by Dale Lewis and Braxton Piner blus a pressing man-for-man deense enabled the Blue Devils to core 30 points in the first quarter and 26 in the second for their highst first half output of the year. Offensive lapses by Newport also letted several Blue Devil baskets in the first half.

After trailing 56-18 at halftime, he Hawks were able to make a little better game of it in the last two periods as they matched Smyrna asket for basket. Each team scored 33 points in the last half.

Playmaker Curt Nelson took scorng honors for the evening with 26 points while Braxton Piner finished with 22. Co-captain Winkie Chadwick was high for the losers with five field goals and six free throws for 16 points. All of Chadwick's points came in the last half.

The Smyrna Blue Devils won their 16th game of the year Friday night and the Smyrna girls lost their second of the year in a pair of contests with the Newport Hawks. The Blue Devils downed the Hawks 78-45 after the Hawkettes had registered a courageous 71-69 win over the Smyrna sextet.

In the boys' game, the Blue Devils got off to a flying start in the first quarter and raced

to a 25-11 lead over the Hawks. Their shooting cooled off somewhat in the second period but halftime found them still leading comfortably at 42-25.

Smyrna coach Jim Parkin platooned his 10 players in and out of the game in the second half as the Blue Devil lead mounted. In the third quarter the Hawks were ice-cold at the basket and managed only six points in the eight-minute period. They did a little better in the final frame against the Smyrna second unit as they scored 14 points to Smyrna's 16.

The Smyrna attack had four players hitting in double figures with rugged Dale Lewis leading the vay with 19. Braxton Piner and Jurt Nelson each finished with 15 oints and Genus Jones had 10. immy Mills and Clayton Garner aced the losers with 20 and 14 points each.
