## High Point Notes

The state Class A tournament at High Point began with eight teams and after Saturday night the Beaufort Seadogs again stood alone as state champions.

All in all, the tournament was a rousing success. All the games were attended by large crowds, each cheering for their team to go all the way. The gym that housed the tourney was a more than adequate facility, with spacious seating and a beautiful floor.

The tourney itself contributed some great basketball, a few surprises and some outstanding individual performances.

Tops among the surprises was the upset win by Red Oak over Jonesville in the semi-finals. The Rebels were short on talent but long on determination and quickly established themselves as the Cinderella team of the playoffs and the sentimental favorite of a lot of the

One of the most impressive players in the tournament, even though he played only one game, was Pantego's Ray Respess. Respess and his team mates bowed to Jonesville in the opening round. During the first half of the game, Respess amazed the crowd with a shooting exhibition that was hard to believe. In the first 16 minutes of the game he scored 25 points on long shots from 30 to 40 feet out. He finished the game with 35 points, but the Blue Jay balance and experience paid off in the end as they eliminated the Warriors.

In picking an All-Tournament team it would be hard to keep the 6-4 Respess from the squad. Ray is only a junior this year, which means that the Warriors will be heard from next year when tournament time rolls around.

Also on an All-Tournament team, if we were selecting one, would be Jonesville's Howard Pardue, Red Oak's Gary Martin and Beaufort's Eutch and Pud Hassell. Pardue, who was the tallest player in the 1-A affair at 6-6, also showed remarkable scoring ability from far out. Although he stands 6-6, he has remarkable speed and driving ability.

Martin was the sparkplug of the Red Oak quintet that came out of nowhere to reach the tourney finals where they bowed to Beaurort. A junior, the 6-3 Martin scored 53 points in the Rebels' three tourney contests.

Butch, who should receive strong consideration for most valuable player honors, topped all scorers in the tournament with his total of 82 in three games. He also led the Seadog play-making, turning in many valuable assists. Pud finished among the tourney high scorers too, getting 49 points. As always, he was the leading rebounder and outstanding defensive player for the state champions.

Sunday when the victorious Seadogs came home, a motorcade of about 200 c 10 and close to a thousand people were on hand at the race track to accompany the team to the high school for the victory reception. At the school house short talks were made by school and town officials, players and coaches. Heach coach Tom McQuaid was presented a gift certificate for a new suit. Making the presentation was mayor Piggie Potter.

The mayor explained that the certificate was given in hopes that McQuaid would buy a suit to replace the one he has worn to every game since Beaufort won its first state championship in 1955. He may buy a suit with the gut certificate but it's safe to say that McQuaid will not dump the clothes he has worn for the last five years on game nights.
