

Morehead Wins 'Give-Away' Game With Beaufort Seadogs Friday 14-8

Morehead City high school defeated the Seadogs Friday in a free-and-easy, 14-8 game at Beaufort. The Eagles' assistant coach Jimmy Parker described the bout as a contest "to see who could give it away."

Reid Kennedy was the winning pitcher. He relieved Donald Yeager in the third inning. Kennedy struck out three, walked two and gave up three hits and two runs. The Eagles were down 6-5 when he took the mound. Clem Woodard was credited with the loss, after being relieved in the sixth inning by John Way. All 14 Morehead runs were scored off Woodard.

The Eagles Eddie Smith led off in the first inning, with a home run over the right center field fence. Mike Clapsadl walked, moved to second on a passed ball and scored on a single by Howard Barnum.

But the Seadogs jumped into the lead in the bottom of the first inning, scoring four runs on four hits. Pat Smith and Temple singled. McNeill walked to join them on the bases. A single by Paul Biermann and an error by Morehead's second baseman gave

Beaufort three runs. Biermann scored on an error later.

Morehead City picked up three runs in the top of the second to move back into the lead, 5-4. Smith reached first on an error, but was forced out at second base while Mike Clapsadl made it to first on a fielder's choice. Steve Kennedy singled Clapsadl to second, then Barnum walked to load the bases.

Mickey Brown was safe at first on an error by the catcher, while Clapsadl and Kennedy scored. Barnum scored later on an infield out.

The Seadogs' Smith and Wayne Merrell walked, circled the bases and scored on ground outs in the bottom of the second to give Beaufort the lead at 6-5. They scored another run in the third, on a single by Bertram, a ground out by McIntosh and a single by Woodard. The Eagles went scoreless in the third.

But Morehead City drove in three runs in the fourth to reclaim the lead at 8-7. Barnum singled and Reid Kennedy got on an error. Then Mickey Brown slammed the Eagles' second homer of the day over the right center field fence.

Eddie Smith apparently decided not to be topped, and led off in the fifth inning with his second home run of the day, again over the right center field fence, about 330 feet. The run increased Morehead City's lead to 9-7, and the Eagles added two more in the sixth.

Donald Yeager reached first on an error. Eddie Smith singled. Then Buff Chalk singled, scoring Yeager. Smith scored on a ground out by Mickey Brown.

The Seadogs scored their last run in the sixth inning. John Way struck out, but made it to first when the catcher dropped the ball. He scored on two ground outs and a single by Biermann.

Singles by Buff Chalk Mike McBride and Reid Kennedy and two Beaufort errors gave Morehead City three more runs in the seventh.

John Pasteur was the losing pitcher in Thursday's loss to Southwestern. The game was played on the Knights' temporary field located behind Safrit Lumber Co. Pasteur was relieved by Ben Smith, in the third inning, who was in turn relieved by Rudolph Crooms in the fifth.

The winning pitcher was John Bazemore, who went the distance, striking out four, walking six and giving up nine hits.

Queen Street lost the contest in a disastrous second inning. The visitors slammed six singles and a double and picked four walks during the nightmarish inning. With four Queen Street errors to boot, Southwestern scored 11 runs. They picked up one more in the fourth and two in the fifth to round out the afternoon.

The Knights scored one each in the second and fifth innings, and four in the bottom of the seventh.

But Queen Street improved its record Friday, with a 9-8 win at J. T. Barber. William Stewart went the distance for the Knights to claim the win. He struck out 11 and walked none.

The losing pitcher was Drake, who also went the distance.

Queen Street scored three in the second. Donald Henry crossed the plate on a double by Stewart, then Stewart scored on a triple by Michael Godette. Pasteur scored Godette on a triple. The runs gave the Knights a one-run lead, 3-2.

Barber was unable to score in the bottom of the seventh, and the game went one extra inning. Billy Davis led off for Queen Street with a triple. He scored on a triple by Stanley. Then Ellison tripled, scoring Stanley, and Ellison scored on a double by Henry. John Pasteur singled in Henry.

J. T. Barber picked up three runs in the bottom of the eighth, one run shy.
