

Beaufort Sweeps Double Bill From Swansboro, 8-1 and 5-4

Beaufort made a clean sweep of its doubleheader with second-place Swansboro over the weekend, winning Saturday in Beaufort, 8-1, and Sunday in Swansboro, 5-4.

In Sunday's game, southpaw Lester Sharpe hurled for Beaufort and allowed three hits, two of them "scratch" singles. Lepy McIntosh caught, and was relieved by Butler in the eighth.

Moore started for Swansboro, but had to be replaced by McNeil in the sixth.

Jackie Wallace led the Beaufort attack with 3-for-4, including a two-run double.

Stanley Johnson hurled for Beaufort Saturday and pitched a brilliant game, allowing but two hits, one of the "scratch" variety. His mound opponent was McNeil, who was relieved by Craig in the sixth.

Beaufort broke the scoring ice in Saturday's tussle with a run in the initial inning. Ben Hester walked, stole second, took third when the catcher threw wild, and came in to score on Tracy Hooper's fly to center.

The Beaufort combination held on to this slim lead until Swansboro knotted the count in the fourth frame. Simon Styron walked and reached third when Ray Hassell erred on Stanley's ground-er, run scored when Wheelless, running for Simon Styron, who was hurt on the previous play, scurried home as Butler vainly attempted to prevent Stanley's theft of second.

Three more runs put Beaufort permanently in the lead in the sixth inning. Hester singled, took second on an infield out, and reached third on Hooper's hit. Hester scored on Fenner Boyd's fly to center, and consecutive singles by Wallace and Hester brought in Hooper. Wallace, who had taken second on the throw-in of his hit, also counted on Hassell's blow.

Beaufort doubled its output for the day and put the game on ice by tallying four runs in the eighth stanza. Boyd doubled, Wallace stroled, and Hassell singled, scoring Boyd and moving Wallace to second. A passed ball followed by a wild pitch scored Wallace and moved Hassell to third before Tom Benton walked. Butler's fly to right brought in Hassell, and a wild pitch followed by Johnson's hit tallied Benton and ended the scoring.

Morehead City split its doubleheader with Marshallberg over the weekend, losing Saturday's encounter at Marshallberg, 4-2, and winning Sunday, 10-2, to help Jack Gardner celebrate his "day."

Saturday saw Morehead collect 12 hits, but apparently even those bingles couldn't drive in more than two runs. Marshallberg got four runs on three hits.

Clifton Sharpe went the route for Morehead to get charged with his first defeat of the season against five wins. Myron (Ace) Harris pitched for Marshallberg and received credit for the win.

Pitching Sunday's game for Jimmy Webb. His opponent on the mound was Herb Pate, who went the route for the loss.

Ceremonies preceding Sunday's game saw Morehead City fans honor their centerfielder and manager Jack Gardner. Among the presents given to Jack by Morehead businessmen were three watermelons, two cases of cold drinks, shirts, toaster, pressure cooker, case of evaporated milk, alarm clock, 12 cans of motor oil, coffee set, waffle iron, cash, and many other gifts.

Morehead opened the scoring in Sunday's tilt by scoring a lone marker in the first frame. Francis Stoy tripped into deep left center over the heads of the pulled-in outfield, and scored a few seconds later when Roy McKaney erred on Wayne Benton's bouncer.

Two more came in to count in the third inning to make it 3-0, which eventually proved to be all the margin the Moreheaders needed. Benton walked and came in to count on Gardner's double. Gardner himself scoring when Piggy Smith singled.

Marshall scored in the fourth when Pittman singled and John Hamilton doubled, moving Pittman to third, from whence he scored when Stoy knocked down Gardner's throw from the outfield and then could not make the throw to the plate in time to catch Pittman.

Benton's single, Billy Davis' two-base error on Gardner's bouncer, and a single by Smith accounted for Morehead's twosome in the fifth session.

A trio of runs in the sixth stanza make the score 8-1 in Morehead's favor. Webb reached first on an infield hit and took second on a wild pitch. Consecutive walks to Benton and Gardner loaded the sacks, and a long double into far left center by Footsy Palmer promptly emptied them.

Morehead concluded the bomb-

ardment with two in the eighth inning. Stoy doubled and Benton singled, scoring Stoy. Centerfielder Myron (Ace) Harris, showing great indifference, fielded the ball very sloppily on Benton's hit for an error, and while Benton rounded second and started for third, Harris leisurely strolled over between puffs of a cigarette to pick up the ball and return it to the infield.

The throw went on through Brown, playing third, to allow Benton to circle the basepaths and score a "home run" on a single. Brown was charged with an error for missing the throw.

Chapel Nelson, managing the Marshallberg nine, then proceeded to make a very wise move that probably was respected as such by all who like to see baseball played all the way up to the hilt: he allowed Pate, a good pitcher who tried his best, to finish the game on the mound and immediately yanked Harris out of the lineup and replaced him with a substitute.

Marshallberg's final tally came in the ninth inning. Hamilton reached first on an error and took

second on pinch-hitter Moore's single. After Billy Davis whiffed, McKaney forced Moore at second. Hamilton going all the way in from second to score. McKaney tried to make second on the play, but he was caught, first baseman to the second baseman.
