The hunting was all done from Davis. The blinds were at Core Banks either in the marsh or stake blinds out on the shoals with sandy bottom. The stake blinds were located where corn could be put overboard and in the sand would not sink and could be found by the ducks and geese. The marsh blinds were near ponds. There were also blinds at the edge of the waters of Core Sound.

Many people do not realize that it is not now nor ever has been against the law to bait ducks with corn or whatever grain you like. The trick is that you can't shoot over corn on the bottom near a duck blind. To get the ducks to come to the blind you have to put corn and some decoys out to attract them initially. Then you have to make sure the corn has all been eaten by the ducks before you get in the blind to hunt. If the game warden comes to you in a blind and finds corn on the bottom you are likely to get a ticket for hunting over a baited area. This is strictly against the law.

Game wardens have been accused of checking for corn and claiming it was there when it wasn't. In reality they might have had some in their own boat that was said to have been taken from overboard near a blind. Can you believe that game wardens would do such a thing? It is amazing the things people accuse them of.

There were so many ducks back in the 1930's that the first limit was 25 per hunter per day when the time came to regulate how many a hunter could kill. You might know also that there was a time a century ago that ducks were hunted and sold to northern markets. They were loaded on the train in barrels and eaten in restaurants mostly in New York. Bet you can't do that now.

I included the story from the Good Old Days section of the CC news Times because while the picture is not precisely dated it could have been the hunt referred to in the news paper story. As you see Camp Bryan men were in the picture but they didn't always come here with Babe Ruth to hunt with Uncle Ammie.

The house Uncle Ammie lived in at that time had jmust been bought and did not have beds in it for his hunters to sleep in. When any of his hunting parties came they were bedded in other homes in the neighborhood. If Ammie was booked up he would send Babe Ruth or whoever he did not have room for to my other uncle Albert Murphy or Francis Murphy who were also hunting guides at that time in Davis. That is why Babe Ruth was at Uncle Albert's the morning of the hunt I told you about when Daddy shoved the purse boat to Henry Murphy's dock and found Babe Ruth standing there waiting for him.

Its a shame not more pictures were made but we have what we have and can find by lots of digging.
