

# Eagles Massacre Seadogs

## Beaufort Girls Post Easy Win in Opener

Beaufort's Seadogs suffered a severe trouncing at the home court Friday night as the Morehead City Eagles, showing a balanced attack, won 79-52. The victory gave the Eagles a 15-1 record for the season.

The Beaufort sextet ran away with the preliminary contest, winning easily 62-49.

Pacing the scoring attack for the Eagles were Bradley McIntosh, Wayne Cheek and Craig Horne. McIntosh tallied 20 points. Cheek had 19 and Horne 18.

**Davis Tallies 19**— Jimmy Davis was the lone scorer in double figures for the Seadogs with 10 markers.

Morehead City started the scoring at 6:55 when Horne made good on a free throw conversion. Then McIntosh scored on a driving layup at 6:38 to make it 3-0.

Beaufort knotted the count with Jimmy Johns converting a free throw at 5:45 after he made a lay-up at 6:02.

The Eagles moved out ahead at 5:00 on Horne's set shot and were never behind in the contest. At the end of the first quarter the score was close with the Eagles leading 11-7.

The second quarter saw the Eagles put on a scoring spurt that gave them a 32-19 lead at halftime. All members of the team assisted in the scoring drive.

**McIntosh on Spruce**— Leading by 13 points as the second half got underway, the Eagles moved off to a 39-21 lead at 5:47 as McIntosh went on a scoring spree.

At 3:29 of the quarter the Eagles led 45-24 and the game was just about out of reach of the Seadogs. At 2:35 the Eagles extended the lead to 49-25 and they wound up the third stanza leading 55-29.

At 4:52 of the final canto the Eagles led 61-34, and they finished it off with a 79-52 victory.

It was a true team victory for the Eagles as Llewellyn Phillips, Kent Brown, Raymond Earl Willis, J. W. Long, as well as McIntosh, Cheek and Horne, all turned in exceptional performances.

**Cheek on Boards**— Cheek, the 6-7 center of the Eagles, and team high scorer, handled the boards for his team and did a marvelous job of setting up his teammates with scoring opportunities.

Horne and McIntosh were both assisted by Cheek on their shots, and their ball handling was as fine as it is to be seen in high school basketball anywhere.

The Eagles had a 50.9 per cent average on shots from the floor as against 37.5 per cent for the Seadogs. The Eagles made 29 of 57 and the Seadogs tallied on 15 of 40 shots.

The preliminary game started off with the Eagles taking a 2-0 lead at 7:47 as Virginia Smithwick hit on a jump shot. Gerri (Mighty Mite) Bodiford knotted the count at 7:50. Daisy Brock put the Eagles out in front once again at 7:17 as she tallied on a layup. Yonda Goodwin knotted the count at 6:15, and from then on it was all Beaufort.

**Beaufort Leads**— At the end of the first quarter the Beaufort sextet held a 22-9 lead.

The second quarter saw little scoring for either team and at halftime the Beaufort gals maintained a 31-15 advantage.

The third quarter was the big one for the victors as they moved out to a 45-19 lead at 3:57 and wound up the quarter on the long end of a 51-28 score.

Morehead City came to life in the final canto but the Beaufort lead was not to be denied, and the final tally saw the Beaufort sextet victorious 62-49.

**Bodiford High Scorer**— Gerri Bodiford was high scorer for the game with 29 markers. Teammate Goodwin scored 19 and Shirley Piner 12.

For the losing Eaglettes, Brock was high with 21 markers as Virginia O'Neal tallied 17 markers.

Kay Willis fouled out at 4:29 of the third quarter for the Eaglettes and Rae Frances Hassell fouled out of the Beaufort lineup at 1:01 of the third canto.

Beaufort's shooting average from the floor was a respectable 43.9 per cent. They made good on 25 of 57. Morehead's average was 30 per cent. They made good on 18 of 60.

● Coach Tom McQuaid of Beaufort commented that the Morehead City Eagles should really be on their way, following their convincing win over the Seadogs Friday night.

According to Coach McQuaid the Eagles stand a good chance to bring the Class A title into the county as did the Seadogs last season.

He was especially impressed with the team play shown by the Eagles. They didn't play like a one-man team. As for the score, 79-52, by which his team was beaten, Coach McQuaid said that he hadn't been joking when he stated that his club would be beaten in the neighborhood of 30 points.

He says the Morehead team is loaded for bear and this should be their year, as last season was the year for the Beaufort Seadogs.

● The Eagles showed strength in Friday night's tilt that was not evident in their last few contests. Three players hit an high double figures.

Coach Gannon Talbert commented that the difference in his club now is the return of J. W. Long.

The return of Long has certainly strengthened the Eagles' bench and gives them a fine seven-man crew.

● We noted in the Raleigh paper that the Dover quintet defeated Richlands by a score of 129-96. If this isn't a record in high school basketball, it certainly must be close for one.

The Dover quintet posted their 20th victory in the game and their 6-6 center, Wallace Lewis, tallied 43 points.

This Dover team is the same that gave Beaufort a rough time in the semifinals at Kenansville last year, and it is expected that they'll be in the playoffs again this season.

Youngsville, touted to be the outstanding Class A team in the state this season, scored a 141-55 victory the other evening over Edward Best. A meeting at Durham between Morehead City or Newport and the Youngsville quintet is a distinct possibility.

● Avery Brundage, president, International Olympic Committee, calls attention to Brotherhood Week. It will be observed next week. Mr. Brundage says:

"Politics, race, creed, color or religion all are equal on the playing field. Sports is a common ground upon which men and women of all nationalities and many different backgrounds may meet.

Teamwork on the playing field is essential, and prejudice has no part there. When an athlete works closely with someone of a different race, religion or political belief toward a common goal, or competes against him in a spirit of good sportsmanship, he learns an unforgettable lesson.

The sports world has a particularly significant contribution to make to the observance of Brotherhood Week. The principles of understanding and brotherhood go hand-in-hand with participation in athletics.

The Olympic Games are an excellent example of how this works out. We don't tolerate discrimination. The only requirement is that an athlete must be an amateur who plays for the fun of it. We take anybody — our doors are open to all. It is ability that counts.

I like to recall the words of an Hungarian youth who competed in the weight events at the 1948 Olympics in London. The sentiments of this athlete from an occupied country are a splendid answer to those who preach that amity and understanding among countries are an empty dream.

"If every person could have such an experience as this," he said, "how wonderful it would be. Then there would be no hard feelings and few walls between peoples, let alone wars."
