Three Blue Devils Selected for Boys' Second Team All-County 1963-64

A strong second unit, or bench, in any coach's book, can make the difference in a tough game. THE NEWS-TIMES' All-County second string, we believe, would see a lot of action in a hypothetical contest demanding an all-out performance from Carteret's basketball standouts. Following are the 1963-64 second-unit selections:

LANWOOD PARKER—at forward. Part of the Blue Devils' doublepost, he is Smyrna high school's most outstanding cage star, and a close contender for first-string forward and center. Parker, a senior who has played basketball for three years, averaged 18.13 points per game this season and 14 rebounds.

He was named to the all Carteret-Craven conference team last year, and to the all Carteret-Pamlico tournament squad this season. Parker is a likely candidate for tournament honors at Kenansville and Durham, should the Devils continue to dominate in eastern single-A competition.

He is a member of the Varsity club at Smyrna, is on the annual staff and school paper, is a good student and has played baseball for two years.

.CHRIS PAKE — at center. A senior at 'Beaufort high school, he has both led and backed the Scadogs' successful bid for the Coastal Plains conference and District II championships this season.

Although not a high scorer (his average is 12.90), Pake has handled, the toughest defensive asaignments with skill and determination. He led Beaufort in rebounding, improving his overall game toward the end of the season. Pake most aptly demonstrated his offensive ability with an amazing 93 per cent average from the floor at Smyrna.

Along with Linwood Parker, he was a close candidate for firststring center. During his high school career, Pake has played four years of basketball and three years (so far) of baseball, is a member of the Varsity club, Beta club, served on the student council for three years and is vice president of the senior class.

DAVID BAILEY at forward. Sharing the double-post with Linwood Parker, Bailey has been a big asset at Smyrna's offensive and defensive play. Although listed at center, the position does not accurately describe his assignment or value to the team.

Bailey, who averaged only 10 points per game this season, contributed greatly in rebounding and overall defensive action. He is a junior, has played basketball for two years, is a member of the Varsity club, Future Teachers of America and has played one year of baseball.

WILLIAM TOOTLE—at guard. He is a junior at W. S. King high school, and has led the Monarchs with 18.88 points per game in regular season play. Tootle has spejarheaded his team's offense, and played a major role in its defensive effort.
