Prescott of Pamlico Breaks 8-8 Tie With Run in 12th Inning

In a close game Pamlico won out over the Seadogs 9-8 Wednesday afternoon at the Seadog diamond. Beaufort snapped back to avenge an 8-0 defeat at the hands of the Spuds at Bayboro several weeks ago. Extra innings had to be played to break a 8-8 tie at the end of the seventh.

Gahagan was the winning pitcher and Herb Mason the loser. Pamlico exploded for seven runs in the first inning, notched one in the third inning and one in the 12th. Beaufort tallied three in the first, two in the second, two in the fifth and one in the seventh.

Steve Dudley was the outstanding hitter for Beaufort, getting three for six and scoring two runs. James Holland, with two hits, crossed home plate once, as did Monk Pittman, Bernard Hall, catcher, George Martin, Harold Willis and Herb Mason.

L. Prescott was the leading batter for Pamlico, getting two for four. Prescott scored Pamlico's last run in the 12th. The game went into extra innings. No runs were scored in the 8, 9, 10 or 11th innings. Prescott's run in the bottom of the 12th broke the deadlock.

Mason struck out four and walked 13.

Pamlico Wins Close Decision From Smyrna Tuesday, 3-2
