WILMINGTON NOSES OUT BEAUFORT

Ninth Inning Rally Falls Run Short as Beaufort Loses 9 to 8

After being held practically helpless for eight and two thirds innings until two were out in the last of the ninth, Beaufort put on a last ditch rally that came near snatching victory out of the hands of defeat. Four runs were over and the tying run on first when F. Longest's fly to right was snagged for the final out after it looked momentarily as if it would get by the fielder, and Beaufort bowed to the Wilmington Pirates 9 to 8 to make it two out of three for the Pirates against the locals this season.

Fulcher opened this last frame by walking and was forced out by Willis. Ray Hassell flew out to center, but Skarren hit as did also C. Hassell to load the bases. Clark, who by the way is leading his team at bat and turned in some snappy centerfielding in this game, promptly unloaded the crowded sacks with a lusty double and himself scored on Ralph Hassell's single. Then came Longest's tough-luck hoist, his second such of the game. One of the two hits the locals had gathered off Skipper, visiting flinger, until the seventh was Longest's long triple to deep left center in the first that scored Ralph Hassell from first base. Beaufort's other three markers came in the seventh on hits by Brooks, Willis, Ray Hassell and C. Hassell.

Loose play and boneheads cost the locals the ball game played here Sunday before a large crowd although they were outhit 12 to 10. Brooks, Beaufort moundsman, settled after a shaky start and pitched good ball the rest of the way, but the visitors were not to be denied.

C. Hassell got two hits for Beaufort and all the rest of the line up one each with the exception of G. Hassell. Trogdon and H. McKeithan each with three safeties led Wilmington. The highlight of the Pirates' scoring was in the fourth when four were shoved over. McKenzie caught for the visitors and Fulcher for the locals. Brooks will have a chance to further enhance his athletic abilities of which he carried on and ended so nobly at the local school and for the town's baseball team, for that college excels in all sports and won especial honors in football, basketball and baseball during the past five years.
