

ATLANTIC WON SABBATH GAME

Brooks Hurls And Team Swamps Straits

ATLANTIC, Sept. 27—The projection of last Sunday's contest (a ten-inning 1 to 1 deadlock) turned into a rout for Atlantic today in a 10 to 1 count over Straits.

There surely is no rivalry like local rivalry. No teams have been so eager for victory here this season. The players themselves and the large overflow attendance so clearly demonstrated this desire today, as the game proceeded through three innings of scoreless playing. It was their boys—Carteret county boys—that they had come out to see in action. But "great expectations" are not always realized. So it was today. Too bad that the folks could not have witnessed a closer struggle for superiority. However, these things happen and it was not the fault of the visitors. They began with a rush. Two hits and a walk and some Atlantic hearts were skipping their beats. But George Brooks pulled himself out of a hole as he did last Sunday. In the fourth Clemmie Chadwick homered to give Straits their only run of the game. The locals advanced to a lead when Lester Babbitt clouted the ball over left field fence, in the same inning, to bring in C. Longest, who was waiting on second. Five singles, coupled with two errors, gave Atlantic five runs in the sixth. At the start of the seventh Knowles, who had begun so well for Straits, exchanged positions with left fielder F. Chadwick. The locals hit again five times in the eight to account for their three last nokers.

Brooks for the victors struck out ten and allowed eight hits and two walks. Opposing Knowles fanned six, while he and his successor permitted a total of seventeen hits. Straits committed five errors. Atlantic three Babbitt hit a single in addition to his homer, his team mates T. Willis, D. Willis and C. Longest getting three safeties each. Van Horn and Ray
