No other sport connected w/ me the way baseball did. Our family was blessed w/ a lot of basketball talent, but I missed out on those gifts. At least in my own mind, I thought I had some skill playing hardball, and sure have fond memories of playing it from Little League; to Pony League games on the old Beaufort HS field...where the outfield fence consisted of the football field bleachers!!...; to ECHS, where we struggled to find a way to get the Down Easters blended w/ the Beaufort boys; to making a stab at walking on at Carolina during their Fall try-outs, and getting the invite to come back for Spring...only to give it up for grades and a part time job.

It's been a way to connect again w/ my Daddy. He spent so much time w/ the Little League program, and then after passing it on still loving to go watch just because he loved it so much. He organized the program w/ Dr. Way's help; coached for many years; umpired games when he wasn't

coaching; worked on making a field across the road from Safrit Lumber near the VFW?

I remember many times having to go out w/ shovels and dig drainage to get fields dry enough to play on. *He threw kids a million balls of batting practice I'm sure*. It was such a thrill for kids back then to have a for real parade down Front St. Beaufort to kick off the season...all of us in our uniforms: Fry Roofing in green. VFW in black; Moose in red; and Daddy's Elks team in blue.

I've still got a ball on my desk as I write this that was signed by the kids on Daddy's 1961 Championship team...we were undefeated that season. Some of the signatures have faded or were unrecognizable, but here are a few: *Frank Krusz, Tony Smith, Randy Ives, Jule Wheatley, Wayne Scott, Raymond Springle, Ben Toler, Lester Beachem, Billy Cuthrell, Rudy Wilkinson, and Chris Chappel.*

The first time you put together a celebration and memorial day to open the museum, I got a copy of the newspaper write up...it gave me goosebumps and was a great thing to do. Thank you for making the effort to bring the contributions of the old guard, and current generation of coaches and players into focus. It's a great game and we all owe a lot to our mentors, coaches and Dad's for teaching it to us; and we need to make sure the current generation realizes how important it is to pass it on.
